c) Have you ever made a decision that surprised your mother?

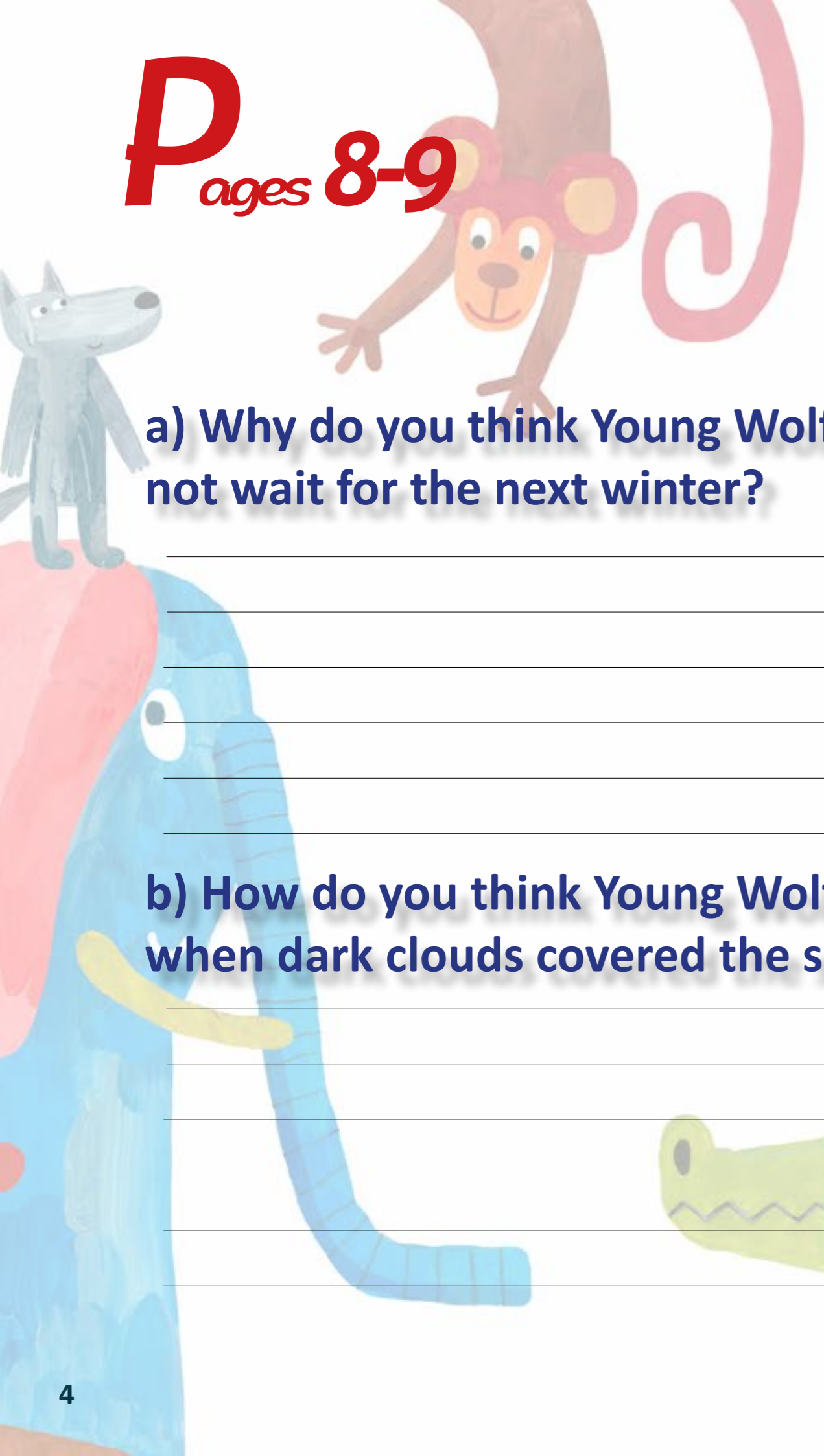
a) Why do you think the Mother Wolf gets worried?
